

1. Thinking back on this week's sermon, was there anything you heard for the first time or that caught your attention, challenged, or confused you?
2. Scan the back through what we have read so far in all of 1 Corinthians. Where do you see the need for love in the Corinthian church?
3. Choose at least two of the examples of love in this verse and note a biblical example of the results of when the opposite, unloving thing occurred. For example, in Genesis 4:3-8 Cain envies Abel, resulting in murder.
4. What strategy or principle have you found helpful when dealing with someone who is struggling to live out the love described in this verse (i.e. someone who is angry, or who only thinks of themselves)?
5. Read Romans 2:4 and 2 Peter 3:9 together with this verse. What observations or applications can you make?
6. Scripture describes times when God is angry (Eph. 5:6) and jealous (Deut. 4:24). How do you reconcile those verses with this passage?
7. Is patience, kindness, etc. descriptive or prescriptive in this passage? In other words, does this passage describe what love looks like in principle, or are we in sin any time our actions don't align with the passage?
8. Write down a verse from Proverbs on the topic of patience, kindness, jealousy, or boasting (or their opposites) and share it with your group.
9. Replace the word "love" with your name as you read this passage. Where do you feel encouraged, and/or where do you feel convicted?
