- 1. Thinking back on this week's sermon, was there anything you heard for the first time or that caught your attention, challenged, or confused you?
- 2. What are some signs that an elder is not managing his household well (vs 4), such that he would be disqualified for the office of elder?
- 3. Paul, in Titus 1:6, says that an elder must have children who believe. Here in 1 Timothy the qualification is stated as "keeping his children under control with all dignity" (vs 4). By examining these verses, can a man be qualified for the role of elder if he has an unbelieving child?
- 4. Paul reasons that a man who manages his household well (vs 5) will be equipped to oversee a church. Does this mean that an elder who is a father is better suited for eldership than a man who is single or has no children? Why or why not?
- 5. What standards or principles could determine when a man is no longer a "new convert" (vs 6)?
- 6. What sort of reputation do you think church leaders in general have in our community? What about the culture at large? How can that reputation be improved?
- 7. If it were up to you, what qualification for being an elder would you add to the list Paul gives here?
- 8. From observation or experience, give an example of what harm can come from an elder who does not meet and live out the biblical qualifications for their role.
- 9. How can the church encourage and support their elders? How can they hold them accountable to the qualifications set for them?
